# Approval of April and May 2013 Minutes

# **David Rubedor**

David Rubedor, Director, NCR brought forward several announcements

- The NCR offices have officially moved. All phone numbers are still the same as are e-mail addresses. New address is 105 5<sup>th</sup> Avenue South Suite 425 Minneapolis MN 55415.
- Cathy ten Broeke has taken a position with the State of MN still working on homelessness issues. Mikkel Beckmann, former Director of St. Stephens Shelter and Outreach is in this position which is now located within CPED. However, Mikkel Beckmann

- will work very closely with NCR on community engagement efforts around homelessness.
- Regulatory Services is collaborating with NCR on addressing serious condition properties. The populations that will benefit the most from this collaboration are low- income, disabled and senior residents. The criteria for which properties qualify for this resource is still being worked out.
- Ahmed Mohamed is no longer with NCR. The position was opened up with 86 applicants. The new staff will be in place by the next MACOPD meeting. NCR sees the transition to a new staff person with extensive skill sets and a visionary as a positive move, especially working with this committee.
- Toby Broderick will be back on as a subcontractor. NCR is committed to supporting MACOPD along with the new staff person to enhance the efforts of this committee and their focus on ADA issues and compliance throughout the city.

#### **Comments:**

- NCR was supposed to send out a list of committees/names and contacts and this has not happened.
- Joan Wilshire is still not receiving mail.
- There is still a significant concern that there is not a dedicated ADA (title II) coordinator and the city is potentially out of compliance with the way they are handling this.
- Committee acknowledges that Michelle Kellogg from Park and Rec is proving to be a very good partner with MACOPD so far.
- 311 App seems to be accessible (a brief testing was done at the meeting).
- Donna Hemp will be attending the Viking Stadium community engagement session where the pedestrian committee was invited – there is still no disability committee formed for the stadium planning.

# **Due July**

# **Toby Broderick – July through March Focus Areas**

## July

#### 311 committee

- Ken Rodgers, Donna Hemp and Omar Magana will work with Toby to provide input
- Criteria for reports from 311 need to be developed including reporting timelines
- FAQ for 311 staff as well as training need to be developed.
   Completion and report back to MACOPD by September

Grievance and complaint process with reporting timeline is incomplete.

# August

City offices not ADA compliant – starting with Civil Rights. Toby can report on progress by August meeting. Cheyenne will work on getting someone from the city coordinators office to learn what they do and how the committee can work with the city better for ADA compliance (someone from buildings/public works would also be effective).

Parking ramp self-pay are potentially not ADA compliant – at minimum they are not accessible. There needs to be education to ramp owners – research if the city sold any parking ramps and if the concession for handicap parking transferred with purchase. The only reason MACOPD agreed to the 4 hour parking limit was due to the parking ramp concession (free contract parking). This could lead to a need for resolution around February or March. A possible subcommittee may work with Toby to assist.

#### October

Peavey Plaza demolition has been blocked by the historic preservation society who then presented a plan for "renovation" that is not ADA compliant. This will be an issue that should be brought forward to the candidate forum, but research should be done to see if:

 Appropriate process was followed by the historic preservation society to get peavey plaza designated (community/government input missing, the fact is was slated by the city to be demolished after winning the hearing pre-historic designation, appeal process, etc.)
