On April 15, 2024, Office of Community Safety staff attended and co-facilitated three break-out sessions on the topic of community safety. We talked with about 30 high school students from:

- Rosevelt High School
- South High School
- Southwest High School
- Washburn High School

Each break-out session groups were asked the same series of questions.

- 1. What services should be in a community safety center?
 - Teens and children
 - i. Tutoring
 - ii. Reading and writing
 - iii. Homework help
 - iv. Jobs
 - Mental health counseling
 - i. Space for youth to talk to someone
 - ii. Showers, hygiene products, help finding permanent housing
 - Housing
 - i. Affordable and sustainable housing services
 - Safe space during crisis
 - i. safe space to go instead of MPD
 - Health care
 - i. Medical equipment
 - Law enforcement
 - BCR
 - Services to respond to emergencies
 - Homeless services
 - Alcohol and drug addiction
 - LGBTQ+ services
 - Immigration services
 - Finance
 - Place to get photos and ID's/DMV
 - Harm reduction services
 - Alternatives to jail
- 2. What else should be considered in a community safety center?
 - Cultural aspects
 - i. lots of new people to Minnesota who don't know what resources are in schools and the community
 - Safe escort to take you to MPD if you need to visit with them
 - Someone at the front to direct people to where they need to go
 - Pay youth to translate for students and families
 - Use community meals, homework hub, etc., to make it more welcoming.
 - Community space
 - i. meals
 - Protecting the rights of all people who enter the center
- 3. What should not be included in a community safety center?
 - Keep people away who make people feel on edge:(police, politicians, unsafe people)

- 4. What's most important? What's least important?
 - Most important: addiction, mental health, economic support, food security, homeless resources
 - Least important: office spaces, legal services
- 5. Issues related to police in a community safety center
 - Some people may not be comfortable entering the building if police are there
 - Need to address the trauma that MPD has caused
 - i. Want to see some lasting changes in the way that police function
 - ii. Need healing as a city
 - For some police means safety, for others it doesn't
 - MPD should be on a different floor
 - Because police are in the same building it needs to be very clear this is separate from the police. Community safety center should be safe for any type of person.
 - Don't hide the fact that police are in the building
